St Andrew's Day, 30 November 2023

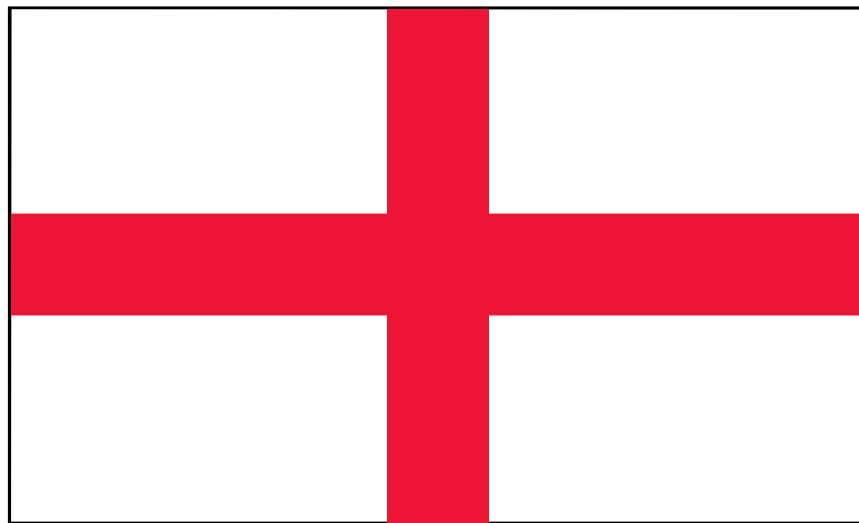
In 1320, St Andrew

faith in 303 AD.

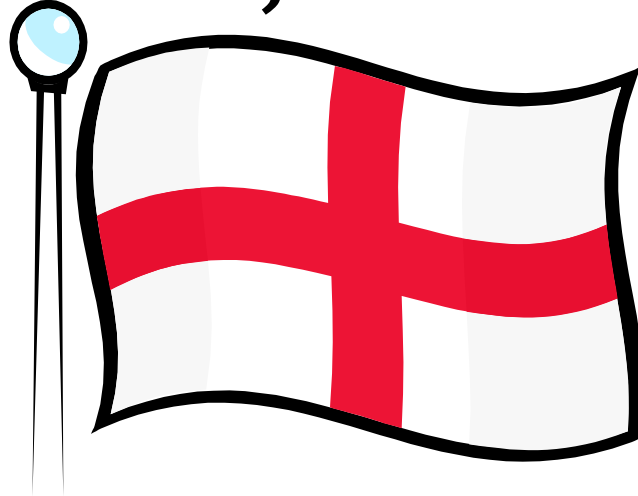

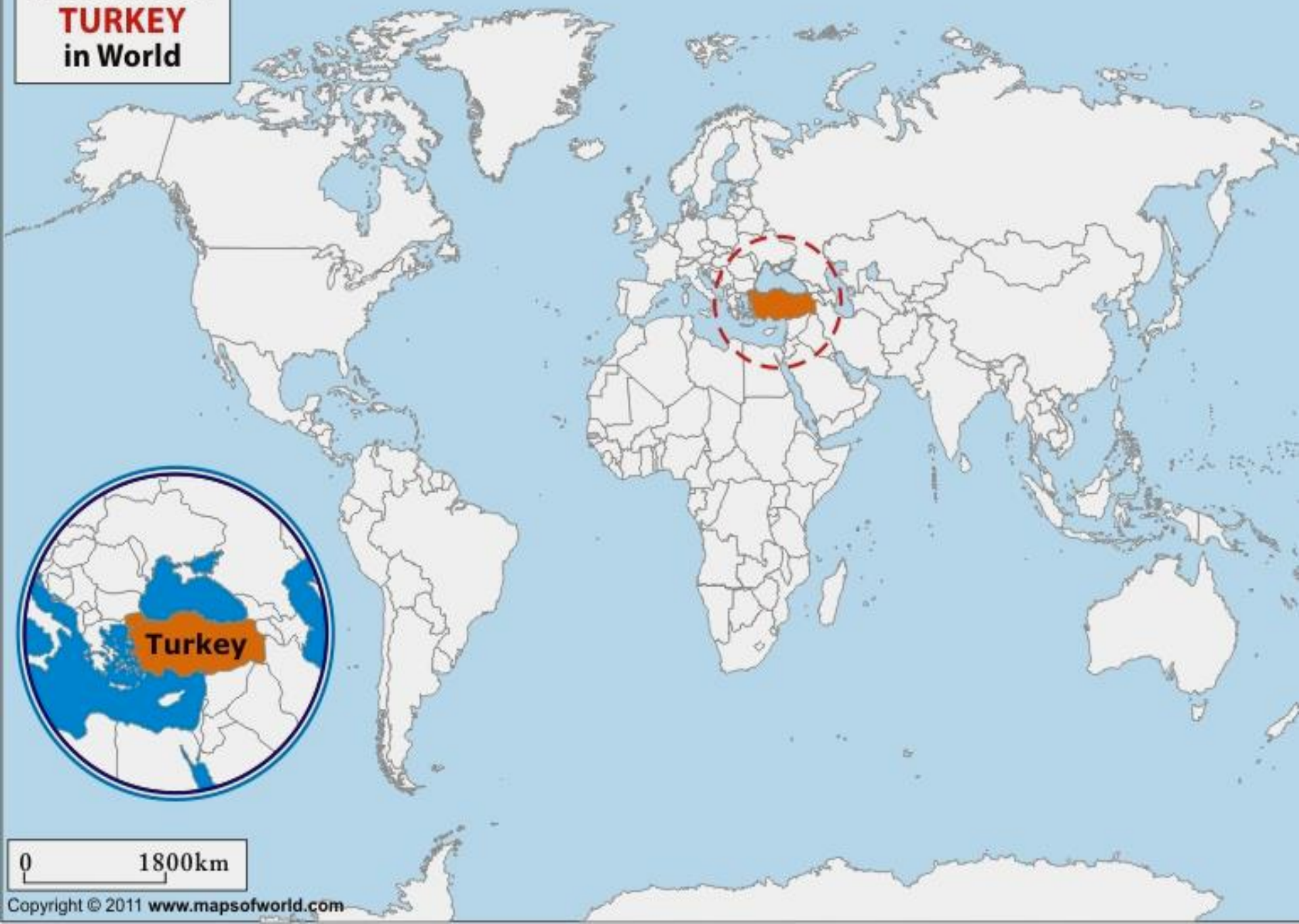

George was an excellent soldier and was chosen to protect the emperor, Emperor Diocletian.



Emperor Diocletian was not a Christian, in fact he hated Christians! He order that any Christians within the Roman army should be killed!



George disagreed with the emperor and told him that he was, himself, a Christian. The emperor didn't want to lose one of his best soldiers and tried to convince George to stop being a Christian. He even offered him land and money!



Time and time again, George refused the emperor's offers, saying that his Christian faith was too important to him.

Eventually Diocletian lost patience and had George beheaded on **23rd April AD303.**



Christians were so proud of George's bravery that he was made a saint.

They built churches in his honour and George's story was used to demonstrate the power of faith and to convince others to become Christians.
